A WORD FROM ASSOCIATE PASTOR STEVE WEBER

When Is Christmas?

On one Christmas Eve day in the not-so-distant past, my youngest son bounced down the stairs to breakfast and blurted, "I can't wait 'til tomorrow ... no, tonight ... I mean, Christmas!" Jeff was beaming. He ate next to nothing before running out to shoot hoops in the backyard, expending pent-up Christmas energy. Every hour throughout the day he would make his Christmas rounds to patrol the perimeter of the glittering tree in the living room, ensuring all is well, at least with the packages his previous reconnaissance missions had determined were addressed to him.

"Why?" I teased. "Are you looking forward to celebrating the nativity of our Lord?"

"No!" he got my meaning and the tone of his "No!" was playful and carried an understanding that Christmas really is about Jesus' birth, but he couldn't resist. "I can't wait for the presents!" There was a tinge of regret in his voice for admitting what every child and some adults love most about Christmas, but then he shifted his focus, asking, "When was Jesus really born? Was it on Christmas?"

I thought he was angling for some sort of time zone escape clause to permit the opening of the gifts a day early. "We don't really know," I confessed. "Early Christians sort of borrowed a holiday and turned it into the celebration of Jesus' birth." He sensed a sermon coming on, and he had sat through a few of those, so he slipped outside to work on his jumper. He likes his sermons in small doses.

While he practiced, I finished breakfast and thought about the unpreached sermon. No one really knows when Christ was born. It probably was not December 25, because Scripture says there were shepherds in the fields watching over their flocks, and that would have been unlikely in the middle of winter, according to those who know middle eastern grazing patterns.

The focus on December 25 came from the Roman holiday called Saturnalia. This was a pagan observance of the birthday of the unconquered sun. Saturnalia began December 19 each year, which, in the northern hemisphere, is when the days start getting longer, and continued for seven days of wild revelry. Many of our Christmas customs have their origins in Saturnalia, which was marked by feasting, parades, special music, football (not really, just seeing if you are paying attention), gift giving, lighted candles and green trees. As Christianity spread through the Roman empire, the pagan holiday was given Christian meaning. In 336 AD Emperor Constantine declared Christ's birthday an official Roman holiday. Some church leaders rebuked Christians for adopting a pagan holiday, but December 25 endured as the date we still celebrate the birth of Jesus.

That's what I would have told Jeff that day had he been able to sit still another minute. But for a young boy (or girl), Christmas is all about the gifts. As parents and grandparents we desire to have our children see more in this annual celebration but maybe learning how to receive a gift is not such a horrible lesson to learn at a young age. Kids learn patience, anticipation, wonder, delight and hopefully, the joy of the giver. And, we pray, they will comprehend and receive the gift that is Jesus the Savior.

The sermon ends with Scripture. I remember watching out the back window as Jeff was driving for the winning reverse layup in his imaginary world championship game with only the dog for an audience and he didn't hear the Bible's voice that day, but he has grown to know it: "When the fullness of time had come, God sent His Son, born of a woman ... in order to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as children" (Galatians 4:4).

Regardless of the exact date, God gave the gift of his Son. He was born into this world to offer us the gift of His redeeming love and to call us to Himself as His children. I can hardly wait for the big day. Let every gift under the tree remind us of the true gift we have each been given.

Before coming to Jackson, I had one definition for “rendezvous.” But now, after living here for just a couple of months, two more definitions have been added to my mental dictionary.

The first definition, the one I knew prior to moving here, perfectly aligned with Webster’s, “a meeting with someone that is arranged for a particular time and place that is often in secret.”

The next definition I learned is one that all Jacksonites know, and it’s that of the Mountain Man Rendezvous. It was a meeting of the fur trappers every summer. The last hoo-rah for these guys was held on the Green River in 1840. In its day, these rendezvous lasted two to three weeks and provided a time for the trappers to come together and do what I am sure trappers did best – swapping tails and tales collected through the long winters.

Now, when I heard that PCJH had an after-school program called “rendezvous,” these two definitions clashed and caused for some confusion. But now, the third definition PCJH has created is by far my favorite of the three. Rendezvous is a joining of elementary school students throughout Jackson – the Classical Academy of Jackson Hole, Jackson Elementary, and Colter Elementary.

With children from kindergarten to fifth grade, our rendezvous at PCJH are always a blast. The kids are picked up from school in the new buses and brought back to PCJH for Bible stories, crafts, snacks, playtime, and even homework time! Kindergarteners, first, and second graders make up one class of an average of twelve children while the third through fifth graders make up another class with an average of eight children.

What do the high school youth groups of First Baptist, River Crossing, St. John's Episcopal Church, and PCJH have in common? The one Sunday a month they get together and meet! These four churches have come together to create something called the Jackson Hole Youth Alliance. With each church assigned to bring either dinner, a game, worship, or the message, a community of high schoolers has been created in Jackson while broadening their definition of fellowship. It is important for Christians, especially young ones, to realize that the Church is not just the building you go to every Sunday morning or Wednesday evening,

but the Church is one unified body of believers. (1 Corinthians 12:13) This means that all of the Christian churches throughout Jackson, Wyoming, the US, and the world make up the Church. To see the youth of Jackson joining together and celebrate that we all make up one community of believers is a beautiful thing. PCJH's intern Abby Powell was privileged to deliver the message at First Baptist for the month of October, where two trees were discussed. The first is the one where sin came to man, the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil. The second was the tree where man was saved from his own sin, which is the Cross where Jesus Christ was crucified. Intertwining her testimony into the message, she explained that we all have a choice of which tree to choose from. The PCJH Children, Youth, and Family team is excited to see where Youth Alliance takes us and we encourage PCJH to be excited as well!



When searching for a new Sunday school Curriculum, one stood out far beyond the rest, making it an easy decision for the Children, Youth, and Family team at PCJH. Group's buzz motto is, "if it's in the lesson, it's in the box!" and it is absolutely true! With different activities to keep the time flying by, buzz steers away from the classic coloring sheets and lesson and dives into developing conversational skills and fun games that have an underlying theme that matches the story. With five activities to choose from every week, most teachers only get to two or three, which truly shows how entertaining

and full of fun these boxes are. They are easy to use and fun for all, even the teachers!

AGROS SERVICE TRIP – NOVEMBER 8-16-2014

It all starts in late September, as my wife and I sit in PCJH listening to Caryn talk about the Tierra Nueva mission. We both have been searching for an experience where we would be the givers and not the takers. I believe we arrive at this station because we want to fill a void in our lives. Maybe it's a by-product of getting older or just taking stock of our spiritual lives. Whatever the reason, we look at each other during the service and decide this trip is for us. I also believe, for me, the trip is a step to massage my guilt in leading a less than exemplary life. On some level, still about me, but I am at least headed in the right direction.

Once signing on, the team meetings are the starting point in my transition to what the trip is really about. I do not have a lot of input because I am a first timer. I listen, as the veteran trippers inundate us each meeting with ideas about things to do. I feel like I am in a high level corporate meeting and the only one who did not receive the memo. Not that the meetings are so structured, but an indication that I am that lost. I say this because, without the veterans, a group of first timers would have difficulty selecting a starting point.

Finally, the day arrives for departure and feelings of excitement, anticipation and anxiety are definitely present. I talk with Susie and she is feeling the same way. Neither one of us has any idea the emotional impact of our upcoming journey.

Bob Kopp, along with Randy Reedy, are the team leaders and they hit the ground running once arriving in Nicaragua. They have been multiple times and provide us some idea of what to expect at the village. Each has an understanding of the language and culture that is helpful to veterans and newbies alike.

I am not prepared emotionally for the first day in the village. The trip from the hotel takes about one and a half hours. Along the way, I witness the stark generational poverty that is present in this country. I learn you will be what your family is with little chance of escaping the circle.

As we approach Tierra Nueva, smiles abound from the kids and adults of the village. The children follow the bus, and as we disembark, kids in the school pour out of the building. I watch the faces of the children, faces of our team and faces of the Tierra Nueva adults. The veterans of the team smile broadly, embrace familiar faces, as they reconnect with old friends. I am beginning to understand the reason this veteran group continues to visit year after year.

Over the next three days, I watch, listen and learn. I observe Kathy with her camera, taking pictures of the special moments. Her ability to capture emotion in a photograph is uncanny. Her interaction with the women of the village to reconvene a women's group is high on her agenda. Katie-Chloe, one of the first timers, is also part of the meeting and we all hear how much impact she has with the young women in the meeting. Katie-Chloe earns the nickname "Pied Piper", as the young kids constantly follow her around the village. When she boots a home run in kickball, the kids cheer loudly, as she circles the imaginary bases. A magic moment.

Caryn, Robyn, Deb, Randy, Sue and Susie all create what Randy calls the chaos to calm moments each day during crafts for the kids. One minute the mood is chaos and the next all are engaged in a creative craft session. Well thought out programs have some of the adults participating as well. Believe it or not, I am part of the team and caught up in each emotional moment.

Each day, we visit one of the homes for lunch. The families are proud, sometimes stoic, always grateful that we are in their homes. They share their stories of hardship, love, family dreams but most of all they share their hope and faith. Hope for a better life, faith in God and faith in their families. I believe we all leave these lunch sessions dressed in fancy emotional coats draped over us by sharing time with these families. By the end of the week, we are all wearing new spiritual outfits – courtesy of Tierra Nueva.

The last day is emotional, as the village treats us to a farewell ceremony full of music, prayer, laughter, tears and hugs. The mission team lines up and the children all come to give each of us a hug. Then the adults come and all whisper words during the embrace. I have no idea what they are saying but some words do not need translating. You just feel it. As we leave, their names dance in my head. Carlos, Oscar, Filipe, Alexandra, Alessandra, Felix, Francisco (all four of them), Alba, Victor, Mirna, Carmen, Pablo, Margarita, Jaime and many, many more. I will remember them all, if not by name, then a smile, a paper snowflake, a glance, a hand reaching out to hold mine, a look of determination and most of all a feeling of unconditional acceptance. All the team needed to do was show up. A phrase repeated many times by the veterans.

By the end of the week, we have come full circle as a team. We are a cohesive group caught up in the hope and opportunity created by Agros and supported by our church. I hesitate to mention the cold showers, toilets that don't flush, heat and an occasional bout with upset stomach. These sacrifices are minuscule in comparison to the sacrifices made by the people of Tierra Nueva. They have so little but have so much. At times, I have had so much but so little. It was an inspiration for me to be a part of the team and even more inspirational sharing the dreams of Tierra Nueva. Hope and opportunity spring forth from hard work and faith. Faith in a dream creates reality. And this place is real. Siempre estara's en mi corazon. (You will all be in my heart forever).
