#### Dear PCJH Family,

I love the season of Advent as we prepare for Christmas! I love the quiet moments when I can center my heart and mind on Christ Jesus the Lord. I love decorating our home and putting up lights around the house and placing ice lanterns on the path leading to our front door. I love the scene from the film National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation when Chevy Chase puts up all the Christmas lights on his house. The reason I love Christmas lights is because I see them as a witness to the message from the prophet Isaiah about the coming of Christ...

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned.

-Isaiah 9:2

The Light of the world... Jesus Christ! As you look at Christmas lights this year, may they remind you of God's presence and light in the midst of our dark and broken world.

# PCJH Mission Team to Las Cuarentas, Nicaragua November, 2015 by Becky Kimmel

Our journey together with a village began in 2011; as a church, we committed to partnering with Agros to purchase and develop land in Nicaragua to help the rural poor climb out of poverty through land ownership. As part of the original Vision Team in April 2012, I joined the team as we journeyed to Managua, Nicaragua, then by bus to Matagalpa and again by bus to Tuma and the final leg of the ride/walk to Tierra Nueva. Tierra Nueva, or the "New Land", consisted of 1,500 acres in need of a road, water, housing and lots of help.

Our church has continued to invest in helping the villagers of Las Cuarentas, "the Forty", to grow themselves out of poverty by hard work and God's provision. We are God's hands and feet in helping to make this happen. And our

twice yearly mission teams continue to report the improvements in the health of the villagers of Las Cuarentas.

Three and one half years later, returning by the same route and seeing the infrastructure improvements, I thoroughly enjoyed seeing the growth from ten inch coffee plants now bearing fruit. We all agreed that we have a renewed appreciation for the work of these farmers. They have successfully developed their village, with 60 homes completed, and a road that enables us as a Mission team to reach them in under two hours daily each way. They now have a school with three classrooms, improved toilets and water for hand washing. We enjoyed our time together in worship and in the newly constructed community shelter, which offers protection from the rain and sunshine. We felt privileged to share our lunches with a different family each day in the shelter of their homes, each a modest concrete block building with a tin roof.

The priority of the villagers initially was the planting of crops. It was our privilege, to help them during our November 2015 trip, to harvest the ripe coffee berries by hand. The two gallon baskets we each filled took us an hour to pick and probably would have taken the villagers a mere 15 minutes. The ten of us were accompanied by 50 villagers, picking the ripe fruit from four foot coffee plants on steep and shaded hillsides. Each plant must be picked two or three times to harvest berries as they ripen. Then the manual work continues with processing by a rented metal hand grinder to separate the pulp from both halves of the coffee bean. The pulp is returned to the fields to enrich the earth and the beans (technically berry seeds resembling cherries) are washed and then dried. Many days the beans are exposed to sun and air on black plastic sheets. The workers must alternately protect the coffee beans from regular rainstorms and exposure to the sun for drying. Then the beans are roasted and transported for consumption by North Americans and other world markets.

Our activities included times of sharing in worship, projects for the students, athletics, supporting the Agros staff with a hand washing class by rewarding the children and their families with a slice of birthday cake for the village matriarch. Men met separately on administrative matters while women joined together for a bible study. We colored on prepared papers and decorated crowns for the children and braided hair with new hair brushes donated for this purpose. We sang, shared photos and enjoyed several skits by the youth. We presented the youth soccer team with a new soccer ball and gave needed medical supplies to the Agros staff for distribution as needed. We cried as we said our goodbyes, "Le te bendiga", God bless you!

# An Opportunity for Community Involvement - Systems of Education Group

Over the last 5 years, PCJH has been an active participant in the Systems of Education (SOE) group, organized by the Teton County Library. The majority of organizations that offer educational opportunities to the children in our community are represented here, including the Teton County School District. SOE started with the goal of maximizing learning opportunities for children and youth in our community outside of the K-12 classroom. The group continues to share the vision of advancing and enriching our community's out of school time. The subgroups of SOE are Early Childhood Education, Summer and After-school programs. As the PCJH representative for the Summer Programming subgroup, I wanted to share one of the great successes of our partnership with SOE.

The "Summer Sampler Program" was launched in 2013 with these objectives:

- To provide a unique and thoughtful enrichment program created by community leaders to introduce youth and their families to several existing quality summer programs at an affordable rate so that families could enroll in programs that appeal most to their children for the remainder of the summer and into the future;
- To reach students who have little to no summer camp exposure due to various barriers, often times providing "at risk" children with a safe environment during these 3 weeks in June and hopefully beyond:
- To address the school district's concerns over "summer learning loss," because research shows that youth participation in summer programs of all kinds can lessen summer learning loss and even lead to achievement gains; and
- To engage school-age youth in a variety of enriching, experiential activities science and nature, literacy, sports, history, art right in our backyard. During their time at PCJH, they were able to explore their faith and learn about God's unconditional love for them!

J.O.Y. Summer Camp, the JH Children's Museum, and Teton Science Schools were the hosting organizations, and an average of 10 enrichment partners also participated by providing activities/programs at little to no cost over the course of 3 weeks in June (2013-2015).

An average of 60 total children participated each summer, and the parents reported that their expectations were exceeded each year. This program was seen as a privilege for these students and their families.

Unique to J.O.Y. Camp, we served approximately 54 students each year and experienced greater return rates each summer, culminating in 2015 with 10 Summer Sampler children joining in for 210 additional student days. Unique to the J.O.Y. Summer Sampler experience was that students were integrated into our existing classrooms. This expanded the children's opportunities to make new friends and be part of a group of peers their own age. In addition, PCJH was able to contribute to tuition assistance to the participating families to the tune of \$13,480 over the 3 years. This wonderful, collaborative program achieved its goals during this 3 year run, ending in 2015. Moving forward, the TCSD is spearheading how the community will continue to collaboratively serve all families with a different approach for the summer of 2016 and beyond.

In conclusion, statistics are important in assessing the "value" of endeavors such as the Summer Sampler, but to the J.O.Y. staff, the "God Sightings" were what made this venture an undisputable success! Here are just a few – Enjoy!



Through witness we share our strength, our understanding, and our faith.


And through giving, we acknowledge what has been given to us.

# HAVE YOURSELF A MERRY LITTLE CHRISTMAS ... COME ON ... YOU KNOW YOU WANT TO SING!

I admit that I like most Christmas music. I don't even mind hearing too much Christmas music in the grocery store. I like how the music of the season permeates our culture. It is not unusual to catch a store clerk humming along or lip synching "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing," a carol that expresses so well the story of God's apparent love for all humanity in bestowing the world with a child who is His Son. People end up singing solid theology without even realizing it.

I also like the songs that are part of the holiday season that have little to do with Jesus but sing nonetheless a tale of joy and goodwill toward all. My kids know that at some point in the Christmas season I will get all misty-eyed when I hear Randy Travis sing that one line: "Through the years we'll always be together if the

fates allow." I'm not really sure what happens. I suppose it strikes a deep chord of hope and love. Music does that.

It is no surprise then that Christmas really began in song. First, Mary's song, the "Magnificant," and then the lesser know, but equally significant, "Song of Zechariah." The father of John the Baptist who lost his ability to speak when the angel Gabriel informed him he would father a child in his old age, a child who would prepare the way for the coming Messiah. By the time little John was born Zechariah was a believer. In a sense he was one of the first believers in God's great movement toward us in Jesus Christ. Zechariah's faith was aroused and he just had to sing.

They are beautiful words:

"... because of the tender mercy of our God, by which the rising sun will come to us from heaven to shine on those living in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the path of peace."

I wish we had the melody. But we have Zechariah's heart for the Lord. And that is enough.

This month, more than any other, we sing our faith; we celebrate this grand movement of God into the world mostly with songs. The choir will have its cantata, and that is always a treat, but you and I, well, we have the shower and the car and, if our families don't mind too much, we have our homes where we can launch into all our favorite holiday tunes. Singing might be the one, sure way to celebrate the birth of Jesus in a way that gives justice to the magnanimity of the incarnation. What other response could there be to "the Word becoming flesh and dwelling among us" that even comes close to opening our lungs and lips in melody?

Christmas is upon us! Let the songs play and may they find us singing along, filled with faith in God's one great movement toward us in Jesus Christ. Now where's that old Andy Williams Christmas album my mom always played?
