A WORD FROM PASTOR BEN PASCAL

Every Member a Minister

Dear PCJH Family,

The Pascal family is home! Saliha is precious and we feel so blessed to have her as our daughter. Nina and Graham are doing awesome as big sister and big brother. Everyone is doing remarkably well: Sleeping through the night; eating; playing together; laughing; cuddling; and enjoying one another's company. Thank you so much for all of your prayers. The adoption process in Ethiopia was as smooth as we could have ever hoped for. Addie, Nina, Saliha, and I all got to travel back to the U.S. together, which was a huge answer to prayer. Thank you for all your prayers, love and support! We couldn't have done this without each and every one of our family and friends.

Some of you have asked about why we decided to adopt and why we decided to adopt internationally instead of domestically. The short answer is... we felt called to adopt internationally. What I mean by *called* is that we felt the Lord's prompting in our hearts and we felt the Holy Spirit confirm this through God's word. The call to adopt was something both Addie and I felt individually prior to getting married and it has always been a part of our family plan. We had both spent time overseas; Addie in Kenya and I in Ecuador, and we had both witnessed first-hand the plight of orphans in developing nations. I have often found that when I am called by God to do something, it is a persistent call that I cannot ignore. There were times in the adoption process I felt like giving up because of the waiting, the cost, and the fear of the unknown. I am grateful for Addie who was the more courageous partner and encouraged me along the journey. I am so grateful for Addie's perseverance and persistence because our family will forever be transformed by adoption as a witness to God's amazing grace. God's provision has been apparent every step of the way and I anticipate that provision to continue on into the future.

In seminary I remember being surprised at how many times God tells his people to care specifically for widows, orphans, and aliens (i.e. refugees). God loves everyone, but he has a special concern for the most vulnerable among us... the widows, orphans and refugees. Around the same time that I was in seminary I remember seeing Addie's computer screensaver at her house which quoted James 1:27, "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress..." This was while we were still dating and I remember thinking, "She's *the one!*" :) In addition to what the Bible says about orphans, the statistics are staggering: UNICEF estimates that in 2016 there are 132 million orphans worldwide. I believe this breaks the heart of God and this should break our hearts too.

I wonder how many of our world's problems could be fixed if every child had a loving family.

At this point I have to remind myself that not everyone is called to adopt. Just because I feel called to it doesn't mean others do. In fact, it would be a disaster if someone adopted a child without feeling called. I am grateful for the variety of ways God calls us to be the hands and feet of Jesus. Some of you may not feel the call to adopt but you feel the call to help others who want to adopt. We are grateful for the many people who have come alongside us on this adoption journey and were a part of Saliha coming home. Thank you!! That being said, if you are feeling the nudge to adopt, know that Addie and I would be happy to talk with you about it.

Did you know that adoption is at the heart of the gospel? The Apostle Paul mentions it several times.

"For those who are led by the Spirit of God are the children of God. The Spirit you received does not make you slaves, so that you live in fear again; rather, the Spirit you received brought about your adoption to sonship. And by him we cry, 'Abba, Father.' The Spirit himself testifies with our spirit that we are God's children. Now if we are children, then we are heirs – heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ...."

-Romans 8:14-17

The Apostle Paul teaches that Gentiles (that's anyone who is not a Jew) has been grafted into God's family... we have been adopted as sons and daughters of God even though we are not of the Jewish blood-line of God's chosen people. Because of what Christ did on the cross, we are considered full heirs to God's kingdom. As a citizen of heaven I am reminded that God's kingdom is multi-ethnic and knows no national borders. What makes us family is our bond in Christ Jesus our Lord who makes it possible for our adoption into God's family.

The Ethiopian adoption process, the cost, the time, and the travel to adopt Saliha was nothing compared to what Jesus did to come and reconcile us to the Father. I love how the Apostle Paul encourages us to call God "Abba". It is an affectionate and intimate word that we could translate in English as "Daddy". I love how similar it is to the Ethiopian Amharic word for Daddy. In Ethiopia the little kids call their daddy's "Ababa." I am forever grateful for my Abba Father in heaven who adopted me into His family and who called us to adopt Saliha. Now I get to be her Ababa and I get a deeper glimpse of God's love for humanity. I pray that you all know God's amazing love for you.

MEET YOUR NEW ASSOCIATE PASTOR Tammy Letts

(Tammy's first Sunday at PCJH will be September 4th!!)

Born in Berkeley, California, Tammy was raised in Monument, Colorado, a small town near Colorado Springs. Tammy grew up as a Presbyterian. Tammy's parents, Bob and Claudia Mitchell, were active in Christian ministry. Bob is the former president of Young Life, a Christian outreach mission for high-school-age students (and Tammy's youth-leader during high school). He later served as Vice-President of World Vision, a worldwide Christian relief organization. Claudia served on the board for Refugees International, an organization that advocates for lifesaving assistance for displaced people. They now work in their own organization called "Eagles Wings".

Tammy gave her life to Christ in Jr. High at a Young Life camp and was active in both Young Life and her church youth group. During high school, Rev. Dr. Darrell Guder who at that time, worked with her father and was one of her Young Life leaders, mentored her in her desire to serve in ministry. Darrell developed a formal partnership between the German Evangelical Church (Lutheran) and Young Life. Tammy assisted Darrell in theological dialogues between Young Life and the leading bishops/theologians of the German church. She took a year off from her college studies to become the first intern of this partnership. She lived in Ludwigsburg, Germany working with local teenagers "on the street", and with a youth group of special needs students from a nearby group-home. Tammy then returned to Colorado and earned her degree in German Literature and Languages from the University of Colorado in Boulder.

After college, Tammy enrolled at Fuller Theological Seminary, where she continued to pursue her love for theology and call to ministry. After graduation she received her first call as the Co-Associate for Youth Ministry along with her then husband, Tom, at First Presbyterian of Colorado Springs, Tammy's home church. During their 6-year tenure, Tammy moved from youth ministry to assume the role as Interim Associate for Adult Education, and then later, the Associate for Special Ministries (women, volunteers, and retired persons). She also served on the Committee of Church and Society in the Pueblo Presbytery.

In 1990, the Letts' moved to Sacramento, California. Tammy became the Associate Pastor for Program and Leadership Development at Fremont Presbyterian Church. While there, Tammy began serving on the board of Presbyterians for Renewal. Shortly after their second daughter's birth, she took a supply position in the small town of Esparto, California where she served for two years as a solo pastor.

In June of 1994, Community Protestant Church of West Yellowstone, Montana called Tom as their solo pastor. Tammy became a parish associate for Christian education and worked to develop the: children's, youth, and adult education opportunities for discipleship and mission. Over the course of 11 years, Tammy served as pulpit supply for the presbytery and chairperson of the Committee of Ministry. She also served on the board of the Network of Presbyterian Women in Leadership (NPWL), planning teams for small church conferences, as a speaker/leader for women's retreats, and became President of the Board of Presbyterians for Renewal.

In January of 2005, the Letts family moved to Anchorage, Alaska, where Tammy served as the Associate Pastor for Ministry Mobilization. Tammy also became chair for the Committee of Preparation for Ministry for the Yukon presbytery, which oversaw the Commissioned Ruling Elders program.

In July 2015, Tammy followed a call to Vanderbilt Presbyterian Church in Naples, FL to serve as the Associate Pastor. However, when PCJH created the position, she could not pass the opportunity to apply. Tammy has two adult children, Rebecca and Megan. Rebecca and her husband, Jeremy, live in Sheridan Wyoming, while Megan lives in Denver, Colorado. She likes to hike, read, fly-fish, ski, and is an avid Denver Broncos fan.



The High School Mission Trip to San Francisco June 19-26, 2016



I've never been homeless personally, but we did meet quite a few homeless people from volunteering and interacting with them extensively through our mission trip week in San Francisco. A lot of people are homeless for a variety of reasons: mental illness, drug addiction, disability, chronic diseases, lack of adequate job training /education, youthful naivety, troubled childhoods, persecution for sexual orientation (oftentimes the case for homeless teens that flee to SF), etc. There is no one answer for this, and you won't really hear the same story more than once.

We found that being homeless is a lonely, emotionally taxing experience. Even though there is tenderness and compassion around every corner in the Tenderloin district (you can't go a

block without finding multiple homeless service organizations, with incredibly friendly people with beautiful souls), you still feel hopeless because trying to get out of homelessness seems so daunting.

Homeless people come from all over the state (and maybe even the country) to San Francisco, because it has some of the best charitable organizations. Even if you go to a place that provides various helpful services, they can't guarantee stability and oftentimes you have to go back and face the stark reality of the streets. Homeless shelters can offer a

refuge for up to three months, but after that you have to re-apply, and there's a long waiting list.



There can be really nice people, but in the end, without Jesus, it's everyone for himself. There are drug dealers around every corner, and everyone in the community knows who they are. Many homeless people have lost hope in trying to get out of it. It's hard to get a job because they might seem dirty or mentally unstable to potential employers. They fall into a daily rhythm and end up dragging their possessions from shelters to doorsteps, to secluded street corners, to even the steps of Civic Center Plaza every night. So where do you find hope in all of this? Our mission team found the answer in the hope and grace, found only in the deep relationship that our Lord Jesus Christ provides for each and every one of us. His love has no boundaries, no physical restraints, no social class system, no

with-holdings. We met people, who despite their situation, had hope that surpasses their physical situation. Our lives were deeply impacted by the people we met out on the streets. We had the opportunity to serve in soup-kitchens, coffee house ministries, shelters, and the sf food bank. We had an opportunity to spend a day on the streets, lining up for food, and just being with the street people. Our perspective has changed! We hope that we blessed each and every person that we met by our smiling faces and our unconditional love through our service and time spent in relationship. I am so incredibly proud of the team of 6 students that Aubrey and myself had the privilege to lead. They were the hands and feet of Jesus, serving, loving and listening to all that they met. Thank-you so much for your love, support and prayers that made this trip happen!!

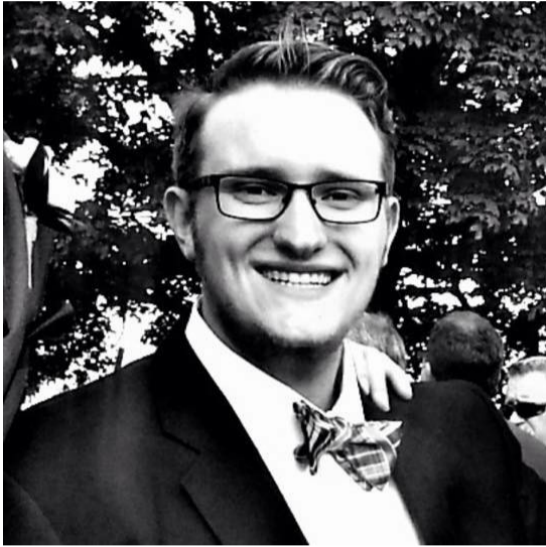

Please consider hosting a CYF Intern **FAQs of Intern Host Families**

We are seeking host families to provide room and board for our post-college intern Conner Morton who will be working with Children, Youth and Family Ministries from August 20th, 2016 through June 30th, 2017. You might consider hosting the interns for their full 10-month internship or a 3 or 6 month portion of their internship. While you and your family prayerfully explore this ministry opportunity, consider these commonly asked questions:

Will the intern be a part of the family? Yes, you will be the intern's "surrogate family" while serving at PCJH.

Will the intern expect us to be home when he/she is there? No, the intern will, like you, be at work much of the time, sometimes at odd hours. Each intern's schedule will vary. Meals and weekends can be mutually arranged.

Will the intern have a car? Maybe. Questions for you to consider include: How long does it take to drive to PCJH on Sunday and mid-week? Are you close to a bus line? Is it a reasonable distance for a person to commute at night or on a bicycle?

Will the intern be able to help out around the house, babysit, etc.? The intern will be a part of your family and as such will be expected to keep his/her room clean, and help with meals and dishes. The expected work load at PCJH will be significant and therefore the interns should not be expected to do extra work or special house projects beyond what is mentioned above. However, interns could potentially be great house sitters if you are away for a period of time.

What will the intern want or need to have provided? Each intern will need a key to the house, a place close by to park the car or bike, and his/her own room.

What about the lifestyle of the intern and his/her friends? Each intern is carefully selected to represent Jesus Christ to our young people, so you should expect the highest standard of behavior. You should also be the one who clarifies the standard in your home, as a witness to your children or grandchildren, if present, and to the neighborhood.

What if we have special vacation plans or a family hobby—will the intern need to be included or feel excluded? Again, mutual understanding is key here. Interns will have retreats and mission trips that will form their holidays, if they do not go to their own family's house for the holidays. Certainly, it would be wonderful for the intern to be included, when schedules allow, on whatever outings you might wish to invite them.

Will the intern be able to pay any rent or subsidize the food and utilities while living with me? No, you are giving them room and board as your ministry to the intern and to PCJH's intern program. However, any special foods or drugstore items the intern might prefer should be at his/her own expense. He/She should also be responsible for his/her own transportation.
