Conquering Complacency

In the Fall of 2016, the PCJH Session (Elders) launched a task force with the charge to create a vision for PCJH for the next five years. This task force would be called The Vision Team. The vision team consists of Kathy Robertson (chair), Warren VanGenderen, Rick Unruh, Deb Keenan, Tammy Letts, and Ben Pascal.

We have had many prayerful and productive meetings; we have read lots of books on best practices for churches; we have interviewed key community members in Jackson Hole; we have interviewed various PCJH teams and committees; and we administered a church-wide online survey this past February called Reveal.

We had 103 people take the survey. That is half of our average weekly adult attendance, which is what the survey company recommended be our goal; so we hit our goal in terms of number of surveys completed. Amen!

The REVEAL survey company published a book called *Rise: Bold Strategies to Transform Your Church.* This book helps churches interpret the survey results and offers great perspective and suggestions for moving forward in ministry and mission as a church.

The REVEAL survey classifies churches into one of eight archetypes: troubled, complacent, extroverted, average, introverted, self-motivated, energized, and vibrant. Being a vibrant church is the ultimate goal.

Guess what archetype PCJH was classified as?

The Presbyterian Church of Jackson Hole was officially classified as a complacent church. What?! You might be surprised, you might be disappointed, and you might be in disbelief. But it's true. According to the REVEAL survey results based on over 1,500 churches around the United States since 2008, we are a complacent church.

What does it mean to be complacent? The definition of complacency is: a feeling of quiet pleasure or security, often while unaware of some potential danger, defect, or the like; self-satisfaction or smug satisfaction with an existing situation, condition. Here's a helpful image of complacency from the *Rise* book:

A complacent church is thus rather comfortable and happy with itself, but there are unseen threats to its future health if it remains as it is.

Here is a list of characteristics of a complacent church, according to REVEAL.

- * On a spiritual journey to nowhere
- * Congregants are longtime, older churchgoers
- * Happy with the church, its leadership, and pastors
- * Curious about Scripture
- * Growing in numbers
- * Traditional denominations that are seeker-friendly
- * Focused on worship service variety
- * Wealthy, well-educated, middle-America suburbanites

Our survey results and my knowledge of our church confirm these characteristics; some more than others.

The survey also revealed some specific information about the personal inner spiritual life of PCJH congregants. Of those surveyed...

- * 50% believe in salvation by grace alone
- * 63% believe in the Trinity
- * 48% believe in a personal God
- * 27% believe in the authority of the Bible
- * PCJH congregants also rated below average in personal spiritual disciplines such as: daily prayer, daily reflection on Scripture, and tithing.

So, now what?!

The vision team is tasked to come up with a plan to address the complacency in our church life and help us to rise above and overcome our complacency. REVEAL provides some suggestions to help a complacent church rise to become a vibrant church. This is what they suggest:

- * <u>"Your First Love" Recharge</u>: Recharge your love for Christ by making sure Session, staff, teams, and committees spend time together in prayer and devotion when they meet. It's not just about church business, it's about reconnecting together with Christ and being in tune with the Spirit as we make decisions and lead ministry.
- * <u>Integrated, Bible-Based Campaigns</u>: Create opportunities for the congregation to dig deep into the Word of God through integrated bible-based campaigns such as The Story, reading the Bible in a year, Scripture-based sermons, etc.

Conquering Complacency (continued)

* <u>Small Group Build-Up</u>: Develop a structured small group ministry that is easy for people to plug into. Spiritual growth happens best in trusted small groups.

As I review the survey results and reflect on my knowledge of the church as your pastor, I would add two additional themes that emerge in regards to actions steps for us to move from complacent to vibrant:

- * Resource our Youth and Young Adult Ministry: The survey shows (and if you take the time to look around our church) you will see that we are missing an important segment of our intergenerational community: our youth and young adults. We need to put our resources together to support ministry to teenagers and people in their 20's and 30's.
- * <u>Create a Clear Path of Discipleship</u>: We are great at getting people in the door because we are so welcoming and seeker-friendly. However, we are not as good at developing committed disciples who live lives that are Christ-centered. We need to develop a plan on how to empower people along the journey of discipleship.

As your pastor I am committed to cultivating a vibrant personal faith. I am also committed to helping this church become a vibrant church. Please keep the Vision Team and Session in your prayers as they develop a focused vision for our next 5 years of ministry.

I have faith in the God who called us into being as the Presbyterian Church of Jackson Hole; and I have faith that our Lord will give us the wisdom, guidance, strength, energy, and imagination to rise above and overcome the areas of complacency in our personal and corporate life as a church.

I am encouraged by Jesus' words to the complacent and lukewarm church of Laodicea in the book of Revelation:

"The people I love, I call to account – prod and correct and guide so that they'll live at their best. Up on your feet, then! About face! Run after God! Look at me. I stand at the door. I knock. If you hear me call and open the door, I'll come right in and sit down to supper with you. Conquerors will sit alongside me at the head table, just as I, having conquered, took the place of honor at the side of my Father. That's my gift to the conquerors! Are your ears awake? Listen. Listen to the Wind Words, the Spirit blowing through the churches."

-Revelation 3:19-22 (The Message)

Let's turn and boldly open the door to let Jesus into our lives in deeper ways both individually and corporately so that we can be the church that conquers complacency!




Wednesday Evenings:



Our Mission for J.O.Y. Summer Camp



Upon beginning my new role here at PCJH as the Children's Ministry Coordinator I wanted to ensure that each program under the Children's Ministry umbrella had direction and purpose. The biggest program and perhaps the one most in need of purpose and direction was our Jesus Oriented Youth Summer Camp. So before doing anything else, I created the following Mission Statement for this program:

"J.O.Y. Summer Camp is a place where campers gather in a fun, safe, and faith-based environment to acquire and strengthen skills, develop friendships, and grow spiritually through imaginative play, biblical discovery and by going out into the Jackson Hole Community and experiencing God's creation."

Fun is a requirement at camp. Kids have fun when they are surrounded by loving people, when they feel safe, and when they can be active. It is our mission to supply all three each summer. We plan to be outside as much as possible allowing our campers space to be active. We hope to hire creative and well-trained staff who are passionate about kids, Christ and about sharing both. By upholding and adhering to high safety standards along with a nurturing faith-based program, the campers and parents should have a good sense of safe--more than enough to have fun and grow.

Acquire and grow are two key words used in our mission statement. It is our hope that campers and staff will feel safe enough that they will push past their comfort zones and acquire and grow in skills like arts and crafts, science, archery, biking, and swimming along with communication, relationship and community skills. Finally and perhaps most importantly, we hope that our campers grow in their faith. Campers can grow in their faith through interactions with each other and the staff, discovering God's Word, and by being immersed in His creation.

The other component necessary for growth is time. To best accomplish our mission, time must not be a limiting factor. Thus we moved to create a program that would have each day build upon the previous throughout each week to allow campers the best chance of growth. We have encouraged families to sign up for a week long camp for this reason. When given this chance, it is our prayer and belief that campers who leave at the end of a full week of camp will go home feeling more confident in their new and improved skills, have acquired new friendships and deepened old ones, and have gained a better understanding of God's love.

Registration for summer camp is still open though some grade levels are filling up fast. Music Corner: Making All Things New By Kenny Hadden, Worship Coordinator

Christ the Lord is Risen Today, the classic Easter hymn, is not in our Presbyterian hymnal. Charles Wesley's lyrics from 1739 are in there (hymn 113), but the melody to which they are set is not the one I'm used to. That melody is elsewhere (hymn 123), but the words are different, credited to the Lyra Davidica hymnbook, published in 1708.

When I first discovered this gross omission in our hymnal I was outraged. Easter just wouldn't be the same without my favorite hymn in its original form! What I've learned since is that which version you feel is the "original" is less about which was written first and more a matter of your upbringing. This well-known hymn is a great illustration of the longstanding tradition within sacred music of mixing and matching lyrics and melodies. In the 18th and 19th centuries it was common to set sacred lyrics to popular secular melodies so that people could sing along more easily: Be Thou My Vision is set to a traditional Irish tune; What Child Is This is set to the English melody Greensleeves; Joyful Joyful, We Adore Thee is based on Beethoven's Ode to Joy. This tradition continues today: the opening song in our Easter choral presentation was a mash-up of Handel's Water Music and the hymn Praise Ye The Lord, The Almighty, with the lyrics changed to reflect the special occasion of the day.

More recently, a common technique for making hymns catchier and easier to sing along with is adding a simple, repetitive chorus. Consider Jesus Paid It All, Amazing Grace (My Chains Are Gone), and The Wonderful Cross, to name just a few. Traditionalists (such as myself, until recently) often feel this corrupts the classic beauty of the hymn with the immature, simplistic music of today's pop culture. What these critics don't realize is that many of these hymns were themselves modifications of previously written material, re-made to appeal to the ears of churchgoers of the time.

All of this points me to an important conclusion: God is unchanging, and God's love and grace are ever-present. Likewise, the truth of the Gospel is relatively simple to articulate. But we are fickle and distractible people, easily drawn away from God toward the latest novelties, whether technology or the 24-hour news cycle or pop music. By continually creating and re-creating our songs to God, we turn this weakness into a method of refocusing our prayer. As we participate in God's plan to "make all things new" through Christ (Rev 21:5), we stir our mortal hearts to understand God's immortal character in new ways.

April's Clerk's Corner Submitted By: Ken Blount



A WORD FROM PASTOR TAMMY LETTS

By now we've eaten all the chocolate bunnies, tossed away the fading flowers, and emptied out all the plastic eggs. Wasn't Easter Sunday fantastic? It was a glorious celebration to end the 40 days of deprivation of sweets, caffeine, or whatever. The church pulled out all the stops with trumpets and hallelujahs. Whew. Now it's time to look ahead to the next holiday, right?

I find it curious how quickly we move past this holiday. We spent all this time with added special worship services on Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday, building up to Easter Sunday; and bam, in one day, we go back to our normal lives. However, truth be told, the real Easter season has just begun. According to our faith tradition, Easter continues on for another 50 days culminating in Pentecost, the birthday of the church. For Christ-followers, Easter is the most important holiday of the year. Without Jesus' resurrection, there is no Christian faith. The Apostle Paul wrote in I Corinthians 15; "If Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is futile and your faith is empty."

Easter changes everything. The day of worship moved from Saturday to Sunday because of Easter. The first day of the week now starts on Sunday. But it goes way beyond dates and times. The power of the resurrection moves past an historical event to the personal empowerment by the Spirit's indwelling. We look back and see that death has lost its sting and grave its victory. Today we look and see the in-breaking of God's reign, here and now, into our praying, our giftedness, our callings, and our ministries. Easter means we are a changed people. We are a changed church. We know the power of God in our midst. Again, the Apostle Paul writes, "Christ died for all so that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised...If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; what is old has passed away – look what is new has come! So let us allow the Easter season continue to deepen our life with Christ and let us live into this new life that our Lord has given us. Hallelujah! Christ is risen indeed!
