Dear PCJH Family,

Our vision team continues to faithfully meet every Wednesday morning for about two hours. Currently we are in the process of rumination and generation as we discern how God is leading us and how best to articulate the vision for PCJH.

We are starting with the very foundation of our church by relooking at our church vision, mission, and values statement. This has taken a considerable amount of work as this statement will set the direction for PCJH as we journey into this next chapter of life together. I am pleased to say that we have made great progress and we have a compelling vision, mission and values statement coming to fruition that will give us a clear and exciting understanding of our vision for ministry, what our mission is as a church in order to accomplish that vision, and what we value and hold in high regard. Essentially it will give us a clear sense of identity and direction.

We have also spent time refining and articulating what our core beliefs are as a congregation. When it comes time to share a draft of our new vision, mission, values, and core beliefs, I think you will find that we are not making any major changes to who we are, we are simply expressing who we are in a new, clear, fresh, and exciting way.

As you can imagine, working on these statements takes time, energy, discernment, prayer, creativity, wordsmithing, and so on. At times it can feel arduous but we know that it is extremely important foundational work.

A WORD FROM PASTOR TAMMY MITCHELL



Young People Matter

Not long ago, I read some recent statistics regarding congregational life in America which reinforced what many already experience, namely that churches decline when young people disengage. According the Fuller Institute for Youth Ministries (and the 2015 US Census Bureau data), adults ages 18-29 year olds comprise of 22% of the adult population. Yet that same group represent less than 10% of church attendees

nationwide. Multiple studies show that 40-50% of youth group seniors (like those in our own church) drift from God and their faith after they graduate from high school. The crazy thing is that the results were the same regardless of the size of the church, the denomination, the geographical location, the slickness of the youth program, the type of worship services (contemporary or traditional), the modernity of building, the age of the pastors, or the size of the budget. But that's not the end of the story...

Other churches are making intentional choices to involve and engage teenagers and young people. Their secret? At their core, they fully believe that young people matter. As Kendra Dean puts it, "Youth ministry is the church's ministry, not just that of specialists who can "relate" to young people. The mandate to be there for young people belongs to the Christian community not to any individual or group of individuals."ii According to Erwin MacManus, "Healthy churches reach young people, and young people make churches healthier." John Ortberg writes, "You can't build a great church with a bad student ministry, and you can't build a great student ministry with a languishing church."iii

One thing is for sure: PCJH is far from a languishing church! All of us want to strengthen the youth and young adult ministries of our church. We have a rich history of top notch people who have invested in the lives of students for years. Thank you to those who have sacrificially given their time, love, and efforts! Due to a variety of new circumstances, we've found ourselves facing a unique chapter in youth and young adult ministries where ministry leaders are hard to come by and adults who have a heart for young people are difficult to identify.

I've been fortunate enough these past few months to be working with two newly formed ministry teams; one for children's ministry and the other for youth ministry. Our youth ministry team, comprised of Liz Collins (our new interim youth coordinator), Barb Andrews, Erin Rosenberg, Tena Webb, and Ken Blount, has been wrestling with this very issue. Our goal is to create a sustainable youth ministry model that reaches out to students and young people with the Good News of Jesus Christ. What students need more than anything else are people who know the life-giving love of Jesus and want to share it with someone else. Let's be that person - that church - with our simple interactions on Sundays (or other times as well). And if you are able to give a couple of hours a week, you could change a kid's life forever. Ministry leaders simply invest in student's lives, have a ton of fun, work as a team, and get to share the person of Jesus. How cool is that!?!

Last week at our last youth group meeting one student prayed, "Thank you God that we can come here and learn about you." It made my day. Because in God's eyes, young people matter.

MUSIC IS MEANT TO BE SHARED

My wife, Mandy, doesn't think of herself as much of a singer, but holding an infant in her arms at bedtime, she can rock You Are My Sunshine with the best of them. When you want to calm children down and connect with them, there's just no substitute for singing. Different people respond to different songs, and sometimes the song that evokes that deep emotional response can be surprising. My son Finn attached so powerfully to the old hymn I Shall Not Be Moved that we read Jeremiah 17:7-8, on which the song is based, at his baptism. At 9 months old, Finn literally chose his own baptismal verse; neither Mandy nor I had any particular connection to the verse before then.

Our Music Academy wrapped up the spring semester with a wonderful recital on June 7th, and to introduce the event I reflected briefly on the purpose of teaching and performing music, and why it is the appropriate work of a church. It comes down to the unique way in which music speaks to our souls. We all have a song or two in our lives that we return to for connecting with our innermost selves, calming our nerves and grounding ourselves in love. And though it feels like you've always known it, in fact, one day long ago somebody sang that song to you for the first time. Music isn't meant to be created selfishly and locked up for safe keeping. It can only do its powerful, soul-redeeming work when it is shared.

What songs redeem your soul and connect you to God's love? They tend not to be top radio hits, but songs you learned when you were young. They are usually simple to sing, and the words aren't particularly profound at first glance. But they've stayed with you for a reason. Thinking about them makes you smile. But singing those songs probably makes you choke up. That's when the nostalgia – that indistinct memory of God's goodness which is built into all of us – overwhelms you, reconnecting you with your true identity and purpose.

Go ahead – sing a little of one of those songs right now. If somebody hears you, let them. Maybe you'll give them a gift that will last the rest of their lives.


