#### PCJH HolyLand Pilgrimage April 21 – May 4, 2018

"A place of dream, the Holy Land hangs midway between earth and heaven." -Harriet Elizabeth Prescott Spofford

"The Lord had said to Abram, 'Leave your country, your people and your father's household and go to the land I will show you." -Genesis 12:1

The Holy Land is a land rich in history and culture. It is the place where our Savior and Lord Jesus walked. It is a place that helps us see the Bible come to life in new dimensions and in color. It is a holy place where God shows up and transforms lives. It is a place we are going on pilgrimage in 2018. I'd love for you to consider joining me and a group from PCJH as we travel to the land of the Bible. It is the trip of a lifetime!

Below is the itinerary and details about the trip...

#### <u>Day 1 – Saturday, April 21, 2018</u>

**Go to the Land I Will Show You** – Depart on flights to Israel. People are welcome to arrive earlier than April 21st if they wish to get over jet lag and spend time in Tel Aviv on the beautiful beaches of the Mediterranean Sea.

# Day 2 - Sunday, April 22, 2018

Welcome to the Holy Land! – All travelers will meet with our tour guides, Andre Moubarak and Ben Pascal at the Ben Gurion Airport no later than 4:00pm on Sunday, April 22nd. We will then drive south through the northern Negev Desert to the southern edge of the Dead Sea. We will check into one of the Dead Sea Spa Hotels. Dinner and overnight at hotel Ein Bokek.

#### <u>Day 3 – Monday, April 23, 2018</u>

**The Desert: Place of Preparation** – God prepared Abraham, Moses, David, John the Baptist, Jesus and Paul, along with many others, for their ministries by sending them to the desert for a season. We begin with a leisurely breakfast at the the hotel overlooking the Dead Sea. We begin our day at Tel Sheva – the well of Beersheva where Abraham and Abimelech made their covenant. We will then travel into the desert for camel rides to an oasis, and experience Bedouin tent hospitality in the Negev Desert. We will return to the hotel for free time in the afternoon for floating in the Dead Sea and enjoying the hotel spa. Dinner and overnight at hotel in Ein Bokek.

#### <u>Day 4 – Tuesday, April 24, 2018</u>

**Choose This Day Whom You Will Serve** – We will consider the different worldviews and tensions into which Jesus came. After a cable car ride to the top of Masada, Herod's palace built in Roman times, we will drive north along the sea and stop at Ein Gedi to see the waterfall, and imagine King David hiding from Saul in the caves there. Next stop is Qumran, where the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered, and the Essene community there, where John the Baptist may have stayed. From there we go to the Baptismal site Qasr El Yahud, where John baptized Jesus, and the Israelites crossed into the Promised Land. We will drive north through the Jordan Valley to the Galilee region, and check into a kibbutz hotel on the shore of the Sea of Galilee for four nights. Dinner and overnight at kibbutz resort hotel on Sea of Galilee.

#### Day 5 – Wednesday, April 25, 2018

**The Kingdom of God is at Hand** – We begin our day at the beautiful Mount of Beatitudes, where Jesus preached the sermon on the mount. We will continue around the lake to Capernaum and Tabgha, where Jesus gathered his disciples and fed the five thousand, and the Church of the Primacy of St. Peter, the site where we remember Jesus preparing breakfast on the beach for his disciples, and telling Peter to "feed my sheep." After lunch at St. Peter's fish we will take a boat ride on the Sea of Galilee and end our day renewing our baptismal vows on the shores of Galilee. Dinner and overnight at kibbutz resort hotel on Sea of Galilee.

#### <u>Day 6 – Thursday, April 26, 2018</u>

And the Child Grew – We begin with a morning walk on the Jesus Trail through the Valley of the Doves, where there should be beautiful wildflowers this time of year. Next we will visit the town and the synagogue of Migdal, where Jesus met Mary Magdalene. After a one-hour drive to Nazareth we will have a Biblical lunch at Nazareth Village, and tour a first century recreated Nazareth Village. The Basilica of the Annunciation is our next stop, and we will see the grotto cave where the angel Gabriel appeared to Mary, and the Word became Flesh. Today we will meet friends in Nazareth, and find out what is happening with the local Christians here. Our day will end with a visit to Mount Precipice, where Jesus' neighbors threatened to throw him to his death. It is a panoramic view of Nazareth and the Jezreel Valley, where the battle of Armageddon will take place. We will take some time to pray over the region. Dinner and overnight at kibbutz resort hotel on Sea of Galilee.

# <u>Day 7 – Friday, April 27, 2018</u>

**Galilee of the Gentiles** – We will have a morning lecture and tour of the kibbutz. We will then drive through the Golan Heights, and pray along the borders of Israel, Lebanon, and Syria. We will visit Banias/Caesarea Philippi National Park, the region where Jesus asked his disciples, "Who do you say that I am?", and the beautiful waterfall that may have inspired King David to write Psalm 42. We will conclude the day at Tel Dan National Park, with a lovely walk along the headwaters of the Jordan River, and a look at the pagan altar there. Dinner and overnight at kibbutz resort hotel on Sea of Galilee.

#### <u>Day 8 – Saturday, April 28, 2018</u>

Via Maris, and Drive to Bethlehem – We will head west, toward the Mediterranean Sea, stopping at Megiddo National Park, an important gateway city situated along the Via Maris which was fortified by King Solomon and inhabited and destroyed 35 times throughout the course of history. We will have lunch in a Druze village atop Mount Carmel, then visit the Muhraka Church where Elijah had his contest with the prophets of Ba'al. We will climb to the rooftop to enjoy breathtaking panoramic views of the Jezreel Valley below. Our next stop will be the Caesarea Maritime National Park, and the ruins of the beautiful Roman city where Paul was held several years before being sent to Rome. We will then drive two hours to Bethlehem.

Dinner and overnight at a Bethlehem hotel.

Day 9 – Sunday, April 29, 2018 Welcome to Bethlehem – We begin the day worshipping with a local Palestinian Arab Christian church and enjoy traditional Palestinian food for lunch. We will then visit the Shepherds Field and nearby caves, where the angels announced the birth of Jesus to the shepherds. Next we will explore the ancient Church of the Nativity, which marks the traditional birthplace of Jesus. Dinner and overnight at hotel in Bethlehem.

#### Day 10 - Monday, April 30, 2018

**Bethlehem Ministry Connections** – We will start the day with a memorable drive around the Security Wall, praying for God's peace to come to all the people living here. We will tour Bethlehem Bible College and Tent of Nations to learn more about the life of Christians in the West Bank. We will go through the checkpoint and drive into Jerusalem with a possible night tour of the Old City in Jerusalem. Dinner and overnight at Jerusalem hotel.

#### <u>Day 11 – Tuesday, May 1, 2018</u>

Jesus' Last Week in Jerusalem – We will begin our day on the Mount of Olives, where Jesus and his disciples spent much of their time in the Jerusalem area, and Jesus prayed the night he was arrested. On the Mount of Olives, we will take in the beautiful view of Jerusalem from the observation deck, and walk down the Palm Sunday pathway to Dominus Flevit Church, where Jesus wept over the city. At the bottom of the hill, we will visit the Garden of Gethsemane and the Church of All Nations. Crossing the Kidron Valley we will go to the traditional home of the High Priest Caiaphas, where Jesus was imprisoned while awaiting trial by the Sanhedrin and Peter denied Jesus three times. Next we drive around the gates of the city walls to St. Stephen's Gate (Lion's Gate). Inside we visit the Pools of Bethesda where Jesus healed the paralyzed man, and sing at the Church of St. Anne, which is known for its acoustics. We will finish our day walking along the Via Dolorosa to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. This marks the traditional site of the crucifixion of Jesus and his burial tomb. Dinner and overnight in Jerusalem.

#### Day 12 - Wednesday, May 2, 2018

The Temple Mount: The Heart of the Conflict – Today we explore the heart of the Holy City of Jerusalem by focusing on the area around the historic Temple. We will begin the day atop the Temple Mount, which the Muslims call "The Noble Sanctuary" and walk around the exterior of the Muslim shrine "Dome of the Rock" and the Al Aqsa Mosque. We will exit through the Muslim market streets and walk a short distance to the Jewish Quarter. We will learn about the Jewish priests who served the Temple during the first century by visiting their luxurious homes. We will see the huge golden menorah which the religious Jews are preparing with other elements for the time when the third Temple is built. Next we will visit the Southern Steps, where pilgrims to the Temple 2,000 years ago, including Jesus and his disciples, would certainly have walked and preached, and where the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost most likely happened. We will visit the Western Wall, holiest site to the Jewish people, and then go underground with the Kotel Tunnel Tour underneath the city. Dinner and overnight in Jerusalem.

#### Day 13 - Thursday, May 3, 2018

**Garden Tomb and Farewell Dinner in Joppa** – In the morning we will visit the Yad Vashem Holocaust Museum. We will then go to the Garden Tomb to remember the resurrection of Jesus and have a time of quiet reflection and sharing in the Lord's Supper together near the empty tomb. It will be a special time of prayer and worship. We will then drive through modern Tel Aviv on our way to Jaffa (Joppa), where we will visit the ancient harbor from which Jonah set sail, and Simon the Tanner's neighborhood, where Peter had the important vision mentioned in Acts 10 and 11. There will be time to explore the port town of Jaffa and we will end our time together with a special dinner before heading to the airport as we depart on redeye flights back to the United States (be sure your flight leaves at midnight or later on May 4th.)

#### <u>Day 14 – Friday, May 4, 2018</u>

**Go to the Ends of the Earth!** – Today will be a travel day as we head back to our homes across the globe. Arrive back in the United States and enjoy sleep in your own bed!

### Trip Details

The cost of the trip will depend on how many people go. Cost is subject to change depending on the price of the dollar and fuel costs. The total price of the trip will also depend on your airplane tickets as you will be responsible for purchasing your own tickets.

Our "in country" price will be approximately \$2,500. This price includes 11 nights lodging with double occupancy rooms (if you want your own room add \$500 to the overall trip), transportation on a deluxe air-conditioned tour bus, all entry fees to tour sites, tour guides, all breakfasts and dinners, and four lunches.

All participants are required to have travel medical insurance.

In order to reserve a spot on the trip, please submit a deposit to PCJH for \$500. Please put on the memo line: Holy Land Trip.

"Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go." -Joshua 1:9

# Children's Ministry Corner

Volunteerism Part 1: Getting Unstuck



Our children's ministry at PCJH is dependent upon volunteers as are many of the other ministry areas. You could say that volunteers are the heartbeat of our church. We could not do what we do here at PCJH without a vibrant and engaged group of committed volunteers. Yet we are always in need of more. Volunteering is not easy. It is however, meant to be energizing, fulfilling, and even a little fun. Most of all volunteering can have a profound impact on those who we serve, including our children and youth. Currently, I am reading a book called "Not Normal: 7 Quirks of Incredible Volunteers"<sup>1</sup> by Sue Miller (the children's ministry coordinator at Willow Creek Community Church outside of Chicago) and Adam Duckworth (the Family Pastor at a church in Fort Lauderdale, FL) who lay out what it takes to be a good volunteer and also get the most out of it. Over the next few months I hope to cover the main points of this book.

The first step in becoming a good volunteer according to Miller and Duckworth is to start somewhere. Miller and Duckworth say consistently that you have a unique contribution to make which can impact someone else's world forever. They suggest finding an area of need in or out of the church that is your passion or perhaps not. Maybe the area of need has a "not normal" mission that captures your heart and your imagination. Or perhaps there is a "not normal" organization that can give you the know-how to change someone else's world. Regardless there is a "not normal" life out there somewhere that is filled with purpose and fulfillment like you have never experienced before. You just have to be willing to find it and start volunteering--get unstuck.

Many of you may have plenty of volunteering experience in the past or currently and though it may not have been your experience, volunteering is meant to be energizing, fulfilling, and engaging for you. It is our hope that PCJH and the Children's Ministry will provide volunteering opportunities that cover those three pieces. However, if wherever you volunteer your experience is not energizing, fulfilling, or engaging, Miller and Duckworth say to not give it up, but to start again in a different area and to keep doing so until you find the area that captures you and excites you. Each of us were made for something and we all don't necessarily know what it is right away.

After finding your volunteering niche, Miller and Duckworth emphasize starting small because in the volunteering world small is big. Volunteering does not have to be a huge commitment that will require the last of an already expended energy reserve. Sometimes the smallest things can have the biggest impacts. Examples of small things with big impacts are the cards you send, phone calls you make, birthdays you remember, the games you attend, an encouraging word you say, the hand you hold, or tear you wipe away. Often times as we sign up for a volunteer position, we have our own expectations of what we are to do and expect based on our experiences or what we have heard from others. Those who have volunteered in the past can attest that rarely are our expectations met. In fact, volunteerism is often messy. The nursery was crazier than you expected, the sermon went way longer than expected, or maybe Johnny needed some extra attention you were not planning on giving him. These are the examples of the messiness of volunteering, but rather than being turned off by the messiness, instead we should look forward to them and view them as teachable moments. Again, volunteering is not easy, but if you commit yourself to looking for these small nuggets of inconvenience, the impacts and changes you make towards others is huge!

Finally, the needs are everywhere here at PCJH for volunteers. If you are already volunteering, can you do some more? Maybe you put in some time in the past and maybe it was a good experience or maybe it wasn't. Either way I think it's time to start again. Or maybe you have not yet volunteered. Now is the perfect time to start. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer at the church or specifically in our children's ministries, please feel free to contact me or the church office. We look forward to working alongside you to share the good news!

# A WORD FROM PASTOR TAMMY LETTS

# The church is.....You!

This October 31, we will be celebrating a highly unique event in the life of the church....but not just in our church. That date is the 500 anniversary of the Reformation, when Martin Luther posted his 95 theses on the door of the castle church at Wittenberg, Germany regarding the controversy around the sale of indulgences. At the time, it drew very little attention but soon thereafter it catapulted completely new and fresh understandings of God's vision for the church. Although the Reformation was fraught with discord and even bloodshed, the core beliefs have remained and lie at the center of our faith today: salvation by God's grace through faith, the authority of scripture, and the priesthood of all believers.

The Reformation did not just spell out doctrines that to many appear dry and pedantic, rather it reoriented people to a new spiritual relationship with God. It wasn't only a theological or ecclesiological reformation but a spiritual reformation. Martin Luther, John Calvin, and others made the astonishing claim that all people, (not just clergy and monks) are equal in the sight of God and all are called and gifted to work together as the body of Christ. As Christ-followers, we don't go to church, we are the church. As the Apostle Paul wrote: "now you (plural) are the body of Christ and individually members of it"

Granted, the church is often seen as another non-profit organization in which we can choose to serve or not. Yet according to the reformers (and actually, to the scriptures), we don't have the option to participate or not. We are the church, whether gathered together on a Sunday morning or scattered about in the community during the week. What people see and experience in us impacts what they see and experience in the church.

We live in a culture that values volunteerism and philanthropy. Thank God! Volunteers have started and funded amazing and significant organizations like the Red Cross, Kiwanis, Rotary Club, and the Peace Corps. We have over 200 non-profit organizations in Jackson Hole area alone. Wow! So how can we be the church? First, we can serve others out of our love for Christ inside and outside our walls. Second, we can affirm each of us is called and gifted by God for God's purposes. Ephesians 2:10, "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." Third, our gifts have been given to fulfill something bigger than us. We are to do God's will. Our gifts build up both the community of faith and those around us. Fourth, when we serve others, we grow in our personal relationship with Christ. Our Lord uses every relationship, every experience, and every conversation to strengthen our relationship with Christ. 1

This summer, let's reflect on how we might be Christ's church - to encourage and impact each other and our community in the ways of God and in the name of Christ. Let the new reformation begin!

# **Music Corner:** Postures of Worship



As I walk through the doors of the sanctuary each Sunday, I sense it is a holy place – sacred, set apart – and I try to tune my heart to that feeling. For me, this involves relaxing my shoulders, looking up at the morning light streaming onto the cross, and taking a few deep breaths to shake off the trappings of sleep and awaken myself to God's presence. In other words, aligning my spirit involves changing my body.


What we do with our bodies matters to God. The Apostle Paul reminds us that our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, and we should glorify God with our

bodies as well as our hearts and minds (1 Corinthians 6:19-20). But I am no less a temple when I roll out of bed on Saturday morning in my pajamas than when I tuck my shirt in for church on Sunday. Indeed, God's doesn't value appearances; God looks instead at the heart.

So, the proper posture to have during worship is one that aligns your heart with God's heart. How this looks depends on the individual person and the particular moment: singing loudly and raising your hands in praise and thanksgiving or quietly bowing your head in meekness and supplication; crying tears of joy or tears of sorrow; greeting friends warmly or keeping to yourself as you respond to the worship experience; coming before God "as you are" in workout clothes or honoring God in your "Sunday best;" praying with hands clasped to center yourself or with palms open to God.

As you look around the sanctuary on Sunday, you are likely to see all of these postures of worship. I encourage you not to compare yourself to others in a spirit of judgment. Instead, look inside and ask yourself, "Am I doing what I need to do to meet with God in this moment – to loosen my grip, to honor my unique spirit, to acknowledge my brokenness, to eschew my pride, to open myself completely to God's word in my life?"

Jesus calls us to worship the Lord "in spirit and in truth" (John 4:23). This means being honest with yourself about how you are comfortable worshiping, even if it looks different than those around you. It may also mean embracing the discomfort of a new posture of worship that challenges you to be more open and vulnerable with God. Whatever the case may be, I encourage us all to consider how we can be intentional about our postures of worship in order to align our spirits with our Creator.





