PEACEMAKING OFFERING


October 1, 2017

A WORD FROM PASTOR BEN PASCAL

Every Member a Minister



Dear PCJH Family,

As summer is now a distant memory and autumn is upon us, I thought I would share with you some books that I read over the summer that some of you may be interested in reading yourself. Below is Pastor Ben's summer book review:

Reformation Thought: An Introduction by Alister E. McGrath

As I have mentioned before, this October is the 500th anniversary of when the great reformer, Martin Luther, posted his Ninety-five Theses on the door of All Saints' Church in Wittenberg, Germany. While the reformation was a movement that spanned several decades, October 31, 1517 was a day that has historical significance because it marks the beginning of the Reformation of the church by people like Luther, and then Zwingli, Calvin, Wesley, and so many others who followed.

Reformation Thought: An Introduction is a great synopsis of the European reformation for those who are interested in church history and reformed theology. This would make a great companion this Fall as we go through our current sermon series: The Roots of Reformed Theology.

Seeking Refuge: On the Shores of the Global Refugee Crisis by Stephen Bauman, Matthew Soerens, and Dr. Issam Smeir

I was given this book by a friend while I was at a pastor's conference at Whitworth University this summer. It is written by the president of World Relief, an amazing evangelical Christian organization that works all over the world to bring relief to people who are in need. They focus much of their efforts on refuperspective of our responsibility as Christians. The authors offer a practical, well-rounded, well-researched guide to the issue. They answer questions such as:

- Who are refugees and other displaced peoples?
 What are the real risks and benefits of receiving them?
- How do we balance compassion and security?

Drawing from history, public policy, psychology, many personal stories, and their own unique Christian worldview, the authors offer a nuanced and compelling portrayal of the plight of refugees and the extraordinary opportunity we have to love our neighbors as ourselves.

Raising an Emotionally Intelligent Child by John Gottman, Ph.D.

This is a book I am reading for the second time. I read it about seven years ago and now I'm reading it again. It is one of those parenting books that can literally transform you and your child. The book is a guide to teaching children to understand and regulate their emotional world. John Gottman is an acclaimed psychologist and researcher on marriage and family therapy. Through this book he will teach you how emotionally intelligent children will enjoy increased self-confidence, greater physical health, better performance in school, and healthier social relationships. This book will equip parents to be an "emotion coach" through a five-step process:

- 1. Be aware of a child's emotions
- 2. Recognize emotional expression as an opportunity for intimacy and teaching
- 3. Listen empathetically and validate a child's feelings
- 4. Label emotions in words a child can understand
- 5. Help a child come up with an appropriate way to solve a problem or deal with an upsetting issue or situation.

Gottman's hope is that this book will enrich the bonds between parent and child and contribute immeasurably to the development of a generation of emotionally healthy adults.

Volunteerism Part 3: Own, Don't Rent!

Going back to part 1 of my series of Pinnacle articles on volunteering, it, especially in Children's Ministry, is not easy, has very little tangible rewards, and difficult to commit to in our busy lives. Therefore normal people will most often not be willing to commit to it. Somehow there are people who do volunteer. Those people own their responsibility for which they signed up and are therefore not normal. We are always looking for not normal people and you might just qualify. Let's look at what makes a not normal person.

Think about the last time you volunteered at this church. If you haven't yet, why not? When you signed up for a volunteer position at church why did you do it? What were your motivations? Did you sign up, because there was a sign up sheet? Or maybe you signed up so you would stop getting emails and calls from the church office asking for help? Perhaps you signed up because everyone else was signing up and didn't want to be the one who didn't. If you answered yes to any of these you are most likely a renter versus an owner of your volunteerism. If you did not answer yes to any one of these three reasons maybe you signed up because you felt some sort of a tug from the Holy Spirit and decided to go for it? Or you felt that the need to do your part in helping shape our congregational and community children? Perhaps you felt the need to connect with our church and/or Jesus in some way and thought that committing to this position would bring that about. If you answered yes to the second three reasons than you are most likely an owner versus a renter of of your volunteerism. Is only one acceptable? No. No matter the reason for volunteering, it is better than not and we have plenty of need for both in our church. However, I would like to make the case for owner over renters, especially when it concerns our children going forward.

First lets look at what characterizes a renter. To be a renter, volunteering is temporary and problem free. They have invested very little and therefore do not feel the need to help fix anything or think outside the box. Renters do not want to invest more because it will be less costly to their lives and thus only look for a short-term commitment. In other words, if you only show up three times a year you will not have much of an impact on a child's life.

Owners are different. They are in it for the long haul and look to help or fully solve a problem. They are willing to be big spenders. Big spenders of their time, relationships, and even their money all towards the ministry for which they are volunteering. Owners believe deeply in what they are doing and have bought into the vision of the ministry they are serving. They push the limits to work on solutions, to resolve conflict, and to innovate and make better. Finally, owners invest more because they know they will get a bigger return.



So what does owning look like here at PCJH? To be an owner at PCJH in the Children's Ministry, one needs to be committed to our purpose as well as to contributing at least one time per month during the course of the year in one or more ministry programs. We live in a community that is very fluid, where residents and congregants transition between homes throughout the country and world, are called regularly to the mountains and the fun within them, and otherwise

bombarded with the business that is life in Jackson Hole. On the flip side, our community and congregation is very giving as we support hundreds of nonprofit organizations financially as well as with our time. With so many options it is hard to be an owner in Jackson Hole -- but it is possible.

The return on investment is great -- not just for you, but even more so for our children.

If we continue to be renters in Children's Ministry we will continue to fall short. So let's be not normal and OWN THIS!

A WORD FROM PASTOR TAMMY MITCHELL



Growing up, the meal where we all sat down together as a family was the breakfast table. I know it sounds unfathomable nowadays with everyone dashing off to work, school or some athletic practice. But back in the dark ages, we would make it a point to be ready for breakfast together every morning.

Each day my father would pull out the Bible, usually the Phillips translation of the New Testament. It looked like the Betty Crocker's cookbook. Dad would read a passage of Scripture and then we would begin to memorize it as a family. We didn't just learn a verse or two. My father wouldn't have stood for that. We

learned entire chapters. That's how we started every day, hearing and learning the Bible.

Do not think we as kids, necessarily enjoyed this breakfast ritual. It wasn't that Dad was dictatorial about it. It was just a clear value in our family to know the Scriptures. It wasn't until much later that I realized just how precious this became in my life.

Now the Bible is available 24 hours a day. We can get apps on our phones and have it accessible at all times. We can access any version, including versions specifically for children, teens, women, or men. How far we have come from the people in the first century! The only Scripture they had was the Hebrew Scriptures, and the stories of Jesus that the apostles told and wrote down. For hundreds of years, nobody had their own Bible in his or her own native language¹. Thank the Lord for people like Martin Luther who believed so strongly to put God's word into people's hands that he translated the Latin Bible into the common German language of the people.

Yet many have wondered if having the Bible so available and so accessible is making any difference. Are we reading it? Are we exploring it? Are we learning it? Do we see it as something worth our time? Does it make an impact in our lives? If not, why not? In 1993, the late Professor Dallas Willard wrote:

We have counted on preaching and teaching to form faith in the hearer, and on faith to form the inner life and ordered behavior of the Christian. But for whatever reason, this strategy has not turned out well. The result is that we have multitudes of professing Christians that well may be ready to die, but obviously are not ready to live, and can hardly get along with themselves, much less others.²

The point he and others are making is that even with the Bible at our fingertips, we count on others to form our faith for us. Yet the Word of God in the Scriptures creates faith in us. It is the way we learn who we are and who God is. 2 Timothy 3:16,17 states, "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work." If reading and studying the Bible lies at the heart of being a people of faith, then why would we not take every opportunity to examine and discover what God has gifted us?

Every week, at PCJH, we have several opportunities to join with our friends to learn God's Word together. We hold adult Sunday morning classes, mid-week men's groups, women's groups, and Wednesday night classes. Why not make it a priority to participate? These are wonderful times to ask questions, listen to others, and to be formed and transformed by God's word. The purpose of the Bible is to be useful so that we might really know how to live!

If there is one thing our Lord wants from us, it is for us to know God and for God to know us. I encourage each of us to come to a class, or at least take 5 minutes a day to read the Bible and to pray. But beware...you may find out just how much God really does love you. Why? Because the Bible tells you so.

Agros Mission Trip


