Adventually: Words of Hope from Isaiah

Dear PCJH Family,

Advent is upon us. This year it starts on Sunday, December 3rd. Advent comes from the Latin word *adventus*, which means “coming.” It is a time in the church calendar year when we focus our hearts on the coming of Jesus, the Messiah. The first advent is Christ’s incarnation; the second advent is his future second coming. Advent is a time of waiting. I believe waiting is a spiritual discipline. People throughout the Bible waited and watched. We are called to do the same.

Abraham and Sarah waited 25 years for God’s promise to be fulfilled in conceiving their son Isaac. Joseph waited over two decades before he was reunited with his brothers. Moses and the Israelites waited 40 years before entering the promised land. Job waited almost a lifetime before he was redeemed from his suffering. The prophets waited for decades for the Lord’s justice. The Israelites waited for 70 years while they were exiled in Babylon. The people of Israel waited hundreds of years for the Messiah. Jesus waited 30 years before beginning his ministry. Paul waited for years in prison. Waiting... it is a reality of our lives here on earth.

The act of waiting is one way God forms us spiritually. How have you needed to wait on the Lord recently in your life? You are not alone. Many of our brothers and sisters in Christ are waiting to see God work in their life. I think of the expectant parents waiting to conceive a child; the unemployed person waiting for meaningful work; the sick person waiting for wholeness; the prisoner waiting for freedom; the victim waiting for justice; the innocent civilians waiting for peace in the midst of war; addicts and their loved ones waiting for a life of sobriety; the husband and wife of a conflict-ridden marriage waiting for resolve; the mentally ill waiting for peace of mind. So many are waiting. So many are in need of the hope that is Jesus Christ Himself.

That’s what Advent is all about. Waiting and preparing for Jesus Christ, the Lord, to break forth and come into our lives and fulfill the promises of God so that our broken world can be made whole again. What are you waiting for? God already knows what you need and the Lord is working to orchestrate God’s plan in your life. Be patient, be hopeful, put your trust in Jesus, our Savior and Lord.

How will you prepare your heart for Christ’s coming during this advent season? I would like to encourage everyone to pick up one of our Advent devotionals available in the lobby (\$5 suggested donation). The devotional is written by Rev. Dr. Timothy Smith from Scottsdale, Arizona. He is a fellow PC(USA) pastor. He provides great in-depth

teaching that will feed your soul and apply to your everyday life. Take one of these devotionals home and commit to reading and reflecting on it for 10 minutes every morning from now until Christmas as a way to prepare your heart for the journey of waiting for Christ’s coming into your life and our world.

On Sunday mornings during Advent I will be preaching a sermon series entitled ***Adventually: Words of Hope from the Prophet Isaiah***. The people of Israel in Isaiah’s time were also waiting on the Lord. The prophet Isaiah provided words of hope from the Lord for the Israelites back in the 8th century B.C. that still apply to us in 2017 A.D.

Here’s an overview of our Advent sermon series. The title of each sermon is a quote directly from Isaiah.

First Sunday of Advent: December 3rd
Wait For Him, Isaiah 64:1-9

Second Sunday of Advent: December 10th
Do Not Be Afraid, Isaiah 40:1-11
Christmas Pageant at 10:15am

Third Sunday of Advent: December 17th
A People the Lord Has Blessed, Isaiah 61:1-4, 8-11
Christmas Cantata at 10:15am

Fourth Sunday of Advent: December 24th
He Will Reign, Isaiah 9:2-7

Our 8am and 10:15am Sunday morning services will focus on the theme for the fourth Sunday of Advent. Thus, the morning services will look like a normal Sunday morning advent service. Our Sunday evening services (5pm and 10pm) will be our traditional Christmas Eve candlelight service that we all know and love.

Post-Advent Sunday, December 31st
You Will Be Called By A New Name,
Isaiah 61:10 – 62: 3

If you are interested in hearing a full sermon on the Sundays of our Christmas Pageant (Dec 10) and Christmas Cantata (Dec 17), I would encourage you to come to the 8am service as I will be preaching a full sermon and a shorter “sermonette” at the 10:15am service on Dec 10 and 17. If the full sermon interests you, on those Sundays I suggest you come hear the sermon at 8am, go to our adult Sunday school class or go out for breakfast at 9am, then come back to see the pageant or cantata at 10:15am.

May you remain hopeful, even in the midst of your waiting.

Greetings, fellow Agros partners!

I have so much I want to tell you about our time in the Agros village of Tierra Nueva, Nicaragua this month. I want to tell you all about the tight hugs from familiar friends. About the success of the new rice crops, thanks to the skill and knowledge of the delightful Neveys, the new Agronomist on staff. Or maybe about the very noticeable difference in the overall health and well-being of so many kids. "Nourished" seems to be the word that keeps coming to mind. Or perhaps you would be more interested in the addition of the preschool and high school classrooms? Or the 4 churches which have recently been built? The increase in access to electricity? The thriving expansion of the coffee production, including a new wet mill for processing? The increased training and supplies for the Brigadistas, or Health Promoters? There truly is so much progress happening in the village, it's difficult to depict the immense impact concisely!

Instead I'm going to share something unexpected that happened and how God has used the response of the villagers to challenge myself to examine my own heart.

The something was a tragedy invoked on one of the young families in the village. Every parent's worst nightmare come true. These young parents were forced to say goodbye to their 14-month old baby boy far too early when he went to be with the Lord after a short battle with Leukemia. And it all happened the day before our team arrived in the village.

As a team, we were simply heartbroken. We weren't sure what to expect or how to act. As we rumbled along the dirt road, eventually arriving at the school where we disembarked, we sensed the tone in the village to be much more somber than usual. Shortly after our initial greetings, we were informed that the family was having a wake for the sweet babe, in the church just nearby.

Now, I know, as someone married to a pastor I should know what exactly that entails, but I did not grow up even a little bit Catholic. And for those of you who are just as clueless, this is essentially the time before a funeral to view the body and pray over the deceased and the family. We happened to have 2 young and very curious girls on our team. "We want to see the dead baby!" they exclaimed. Grade-schoolers sure do have a way with words.

Thankfully, God also placed a Palliative Care physician on our team, the lovely Sue Taylor. She was instrumental in helping Diane and me walk through this new and unexpected experience with our daughters. Her advice? 1. Absolutely, they should view the child if they so desire. 2. In much more eloquent terms, she essentially said, "**Be quiet but be present.**"

You would not believe how difficult it is to walk into an unknown situation and not try to explain it to my curious child! Like I would even be the person to do that; reference several paragraphs above on my vast experience with wakes.

As I followed Nina and the rest of our team into the simple wooden church with dirt floors, I noticed several things. First, I noticed a too-small casket with an angel inside and my heart wept for the loss. I noticed Nina and Lucia being extremely curious yet reverent and I was beyond grateful for Sue's guidance. But then, I noticed people. Community. Mothers sitting in chairs, nursing babies, speaking quietly. Children roaming in and out. From what I could see, they had been there for a while and there was no indication that they would be leaving anytime soon. And even though the occasion was painstaking, there was some sense of comfort as the burden was shared.


Be Quiet, but be Present.

We talk a lot about the Power of Presence when we talk about Agros. Specifically, we talk about *showing* the Power of Presence. But in this instance, I found myself as the student. So often when we do mission trips we go out to be the hands and feet of Jesus. For most of us, myself included, this stirs up visions of "doing." Doing work, building structures, preparing activities for kids, and the like. We make it our mission to offer ourselves by way of service. But you know what hands and feet are good for besides "doing?" Hands and feet are also good for "being." In the church during the wake that day, I saw hands holding other hands, offering comfort and healing presence. And I saw feet planted firmly on the ground, willing to stand with others in their grief. I can't help but think that Jesus would find no greater purpose for his hands and feet than that.

I came away from that particular experience both inspired and challenged. Inspired as a witness to the Power of Presence in action within the village. Challenged to be better in my own life back here in Jackson. Especially as we enter into this season of Advent. It is so easy to pack our schedules with do, do, do. But when we do that we leave no space for the moments Jesus is calling us to be, be, be. And as I saw in Tierra Nueva, this is sometimes the most important and meaningful work we can do. May you be inspired and challenged as well to **be Quiet and be Present**. To make space, to notice gentle nudges from the Holy Spirit, and to choose to practice the Power of Presence with those who need it most.

Making Connections

Who in your life made a profound impact on your faith in Christ? Was it a Sunday School teacher? A youth leader? A pastor? A friend? Probably more than one person. Whomever it was, I bet the reason for that person making a profound impact on your faith was due to a profound connection between the two of you. I truly doubt that listening to a teacher in the basement of a church lecture you about Jesus or read a bible story impacted you nearly as much. At least it didn't for me. I remember visiting a friend's church when I was in elementary school most Sundays and enjoying the time to run around and explore the old church building with my friends before and after the service. What I remember not enjoying was heading down to the old dusty basement where we had to sit still and listen to some old guy ramble on about David and Goliath or some character named Jesus. No one at Sunday School really seemed to reach out to me and connect with me. It wasn't until much later in my life when I went off to college that I formed relationships with some friends, a coach, and a chaplain. Only then, when I had built relationships and connections with believers in Christ, was I able to form a relationship with Christ as well and therefore be transformed.

Daniel De Jesus wrote a blog, titled *Why the Church Needs Less Volunteers and More Mentors*, which was about how children's ministries need to update their approach to Sunday School and similar programs. He says,

For decades, teaching Sunday school has been seen as information transfer, while mentoring has been about forming authentic relationships. One is transactional. The other is transformational.

De Jesus' encourages the children's coordinators and volunteers of the world to adopt a mentor mindset, rather than an opportunity to pass on information or babysit the congregation's kids. I agree with Daniel, and as a former Middle School classroom teacher for nine years, a head coach for seven, and experience in camping ministries I have witnessed the power of influence adults can have when they connect with a child and I am sure you have too. Passing on information and telling bible stories is not bad, it just isn't very effective unless you have a deep connection with whom you are passing the information on to. Only then will we have a profound impact.

As the Children's Ministry Coordinator, I feel it is my job to find people who will build relationships with our congregation's kids. We have a top-notch curriculum, which is designed to engage the children and the enlighten them as well. But without transformational relationships, transformation will not happen. Transformational relationships are happening here at PCJH as we average seven to eight Sunday School leaders and assistants and around 40 kids (cradle-5th grade) every Sunday. Meaningful connections are also occurring on Wednesday afternoons with our After-School Adventures program and during the summer with J.O.Y. Summer Camp. But in all cases, we need more connections. Have you made a connection with a child here at PCJH? Don't miss out!

Christmas is coming!

Now, we may have two very different reactions to that statement. Some of us get super excited and can't wait to pull out our Perry Como, colored lights, red bows, and cedar wreaths. Others of us go into panic mode. We wonder how in the world we're going to make ends meet, or when we will find time to write the Christmas letter, or how will we get those packages sent to our families? And is it too late to order the turkey? If you are at all like me, perhaps one of the biggest struggles I face during this season is the sense of urgency. All of a sudden, the things that "need to get done" become front and center. What is urgent replaces what is important. Like Alice's white rabbit, "hurry, hurry, hurry" becomes a mantra.

When I read the scriptures, I am struck by Jesus' life. Here was a man who every day had countless demands on him; to heal, to work, to teach, to prepare, to pray, to be with people, to travel, to worship, or to listen. Jesus' experiences were not dissimilar to ours; with pressures to perform or accomplish. His life was difficult, because.... "life is difficult" (to quote Scott Peck.) But there was something else unique about him. He never was in a hurry. In fact, even in a moment of perceived crises of someone dying, he stopped to talk to a woman who touched the fringe of his cloak. He waited several days before going to Lazarus' home. He took time to write in the sand while the Pharisees were demanding to stone a woman caught in adultery. The great Scottish pastor and theologian, James Stewart wrote that Jesus moved through life with "exquisite leisure". He had a different perspective of time and priorities. He wasn't dictated by urgency rather by love.

Christmas can be a wonderful opportunity to perhaps reorient our busy lives around this One who can bring us a new perspective. This Jesus has only one real focus, which is us. In fact, there is one time where we do see someone running in the scriptures: it's when the father runs to meet the prodigal son coming home. If ever God is in a hurry, it is to meet us, embrace us, and welcome us home.




