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

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## CONNECT

an activity that invites kids to share with others and build on their understanding

Welcome kids and spend time engaging in conversation and catching up. Get ready to experience today's story.

Before kids arrive, take a few moments to pray for them. Thank God that when life is scary and hard, He is there to help us through. Pray that this truth would be comforting for kids who are in difficult or uncertain circumstances. Pray for wisdom as you guide today's conversation, that you would be able to speak words of truth and encouragement.

### **1. EARLY ARRIVER IDEA**

WHAT YOU NEED: Offering container, picture books

#### WHAT YOU DO:

- Welcome kids, and show them where to place their offerings.
- Divide kids into groups of two or three. Try to group stronger readers with those who may struggle.
- Give each group a book to read aloud together.
- Encourage kids to talk about whether or not they liked the ending and why.
- If you have time, switch books and do it again.

### **2. ROUNDABOUT STORY**

WHAT YOU NEED: No supplies needed

#### WHAT YOU DO:

- Guide the kids to sit in a circle with you.
- Start telling a story by saying two or three sentences and then clap once.
- Examples of story starters:
  - One day, a boy named Carlos woke up and his fingers had turned into carrots! He didn't know what to do!
  - It was a normal day. Evangeline woke up, got ready for school, and hopped into the backseat of the car. BUT THEN . . .
- Direct the kid to your left to add a few more sentences to the story until they hear you clap.
- Continue around the circle in this way.
- Keep going until time runs out or the story devolves into absolute silliness.
- If you have time, start a new story.

#### WHAT YOU SAY:

"That was such a silly and roundabout story! We had no idea where it was going to go or how it was going to end. In fact, I still don't think it ended! We don't know the end of the story. **[Transition] Let's go to Large Group, where** we'll hear about someone who knows the end of EVERY story!"

Lead your group to the Large Group area.

## \* 1. THE STORIES OF OLD

WHAT YOU NEED: Play-Doh®

#### WHAT YOU DO:

- Remind kids that in today's story, Stephen told the Sanhedrin stories from Israel's history.
- Ask kids to recall some of the stories they've learned in Small Group throughout this school year.
- Encourage them to use the Play-Doh to shape a character or item from the story.
- As kids work, ask them what they're making and what the story was about.
- If kids need help remembering stories, here are some highlights:
  - Noah
  - Joseph's story
  - Moses and the burning bush
  - Israel crossing the Red Sea
  - David and Goliath
  - Daniel and the lions' den
  - Jesus' birth
  - John the Baptist baptizing Jesus
  - Jesus at Mary and Martha's house
  - Zacchaeus
  - The story of the lost son (the prodigal son)
  - Jesus' death and resurrection

#### WHAT YOU SAY:

"You are all great Bible storytellers! So was Stephen. He told the leaders all about God and His chosen people, the Israelites, and about Jesus. But the leaders were angry with him. They didn't like what he was saying. So they were very mean to him, they shouted at him, and they threw stones at him. It wasn't fair! But Stephen kept going and kept living and speaking for God until his last breath. He even asked God to forgive the leaders. He knew that God knew the end of the story, and he trusted God with everything he had. We can do the same. We can **keep going because God knows the end of the story.** We might not ever be in a situation like Stephen is, but we face tough times sometimes, too. When we do, we can remember that God knows everything, and we can trust Him!"

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### 2. TRUST ME CRAFT

**WHAT YOU NEED:** Paper plates, scissors, jumbo craft sticks, rubber cement, markers, decorative materials


#### WHAT YOU DO:

- Tell the kids you're going to tell them how to make a craft, but you're not going to tell them what it is. They'll just have to trust you!
  - However, we're telling YOU that they'll be making a handheld fan.
- Give a paper plate to every two kids.
- Show them how to fold the plate exactly in half and then cut along the fold.
- Each kid gets half a plate.
- Instruct kids to use the markers and decorative materials to decorate both sides of their plate. They can decorate it however they wish.
  - However, if they're drawing a scene of some kind, let them know that the straight edge of the plate is the bottom.
- Give each kid two craft sticks.
- Tell kids to use the markers to color the craft sticks.
- Show kids how to hold the craft sticks so they form a very wide V (it should be about a 120-degree angle) with the bottoms of the sticks overlapping just a bit.
  - Don't tell the kids, but this is the handle of the fan.
- Dab some rubber cement where the sticks overlap, and tell kids to press hard on the sticks so they'll stick together.
- Then dab some rubber cement to the top of each stick, and place the straight edge of the plate onto those ends. Tell kids to press tightly on both sides so they'll stick together.
- Ask kids what they just made!

#### WHAT YOU SAY:

"You just made a handheld fan! You had NO idea what you were making until we were finished, did you? But I did! I knew the end of the craft-the end of the story. GOD knows the end of each of our stories and the end of the story of the entire world! Isn't that amazing? When things get tough or life gets frustrating because we just don't know what's going to happen, we can trust that God knows. We can keep going because God knows the end of the story!"





#### MEMORY VERSE

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
I can trust God no matter what.

- Divide kids into two teams.
- Line the teams up at one end of your space.
- Shuffle each set of phrases, and place a set on the ground across from each team.
- Lead kids to relay to get the phrases and put the verse in order.
- While the teams are putting the verse in order, set a Bible, a half sheet of paper, and a pencil near each group.
- When one team realizes they're missing a phrase, challenge them to write it on the blank half sheet of paper. If needed, they can look it up in the Bible.

#### WHAT YOU SAY:

"You were missing the end of the verse in this game, but you knew it anyway! Because you've been practicing this verse all month, you knew the end of the verse. God doesn't need to practice to know everything there is to know about everything—including the end to everybody's story and the story of the entire world! That makes me so excited, because I know that He is in control of everything. It helps me to keep going, even when things seem impossible or tough. Keep going because God knows the end of the story."





#### Tell kids to think about something in their lives that they don't know the end of the story to.

- Maybe their grandma is very sick.
- Maybe their birthday is coming up, and they don't know if they'll get what they asked for.
- Maybe their parents are fighting a lot.
- Maybe their cat ran away.
- Maybe their best friend hasn't wanted to play with them at recess for the past few days.
- When they think of something, tell them to use their fan to fan their faces, so you'll know they're finished.

### WHAT YOU SAY:

"You can stop fanning now. There are a lot of things in our lives that we don't know the end of the story to. Some of those are very serious things, like somebody being very sick. And some of them are more fun things, like not knowing what you'll get for your birthday. But no matter what the story is, God knows the end of it! And we can trust that He will always do what's best, because He loves us. We can **keep going because God knows the end of the story.** Let's pray.

"Dear God, You are so awesome and amazing. You know everything, and that is SO cool! And because You know everything, we know we can trust you with our stories, because you know the end of them. Thanks for loving us, God. Amen."

As adults arrive to pick up, tell them to ask kids about what it was like to make their fans.

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
