Topic: Post Election Pastoral Response

Text: Psalm 46; Romans 1:9-12 Title: Where Do We Go From Here?

Opening Questions:

1. Was there ever a time when your life was threatened? How did you respond?

2. Has there been a time in your life where everything seems to be out of your control? What helped you through that situation?

Discussion Questions

- 1. Have you ever felt that God does not help you in times of trouble? Why?
- 2. How do you measure faithfulness? What does it look like?
- 3. When God tests you, or bad stuff happens, how might this be a time for you to learn and to trust Him?
- 4. In what ways have you experienced God as a refuge, a strength, and a very present help in trouble?
- 5. Why is it despite God's faithfulness in the past, troubles in the present or anticipated future troubles can tempt us to fear rather than faith?
- 6. How is hope fueled in your heart knowing there is a city where we will dwell with the Most High that will never be moved?
- 7. Look at verses 7 and 11 of Psalm 46. How do these verses teach us how we can know God as the almighty? What does it mean that the Lord is almighty?
- 8. Psalm 46 is best known for Verse 10. This verse is in contrast to much of the psalm as it is a psalm of activity. What resonates with you the activity or stillness?
- 9. What does it mean for you to be still and know God? What does that look like?
- 10. What verses speak into the pandemic we are living in? What words or phrases bring you comfort?
- 11. How can you relate this psalm to your life in Christ? Based on your time spent with Psalm 46, what does it mean for your life, priorities, and decisions?
- 12. Read again Romans 12:9-21. What phrases strike you the most? Why?
- 13. How, according to Paul, might our attitude make a big difference as we express our gifts?
- 14. What does Paul say we are to do about evil?
- 15. What role should the people of God (the church) play in society today? Should Christians be involved in politics? Why or why not?
- 16. How is Christ himself an example of living out what Paul calls for in verses 14-21?
- 17. The early part of Romans 12 (vv. 1-13) deals with what we might call the inner life of the church. This last section (vv. 14-21) is about how Christians behave within the wider public world. How would the wider world respond to seeing the church live out what's described in 14-21?
- 18. Talk about how our inner life is to be reflected in our outer life.
